HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

The Highway Department was very fortunate to submit a grant to the Clean Fleet Grant program. In doing so the town was able to obtain a new truck. The truck is a 2024 International CV515 Plow Truck. The town received 80% of the cost for the vehicle, which equated to \$134,160.00 from NHDES. The town also purchased a backhoe. Though it was not purchased through a grant, we did solidify a great deal with Milton Cat, the total cost of the backhoe was \$148,000.00. Both pieces of equipment have allowed us to get work done, escaping the many breakdowns and repairs that were needed in the past.

The highway crew has been busy all summer and appreciate the support of the residents.

WATER & SEWER COMMISSION

The Bennington water and sewer commissioners have written a plan to increase rates in a manner that spreads out the increase over the next few billing cycles.

It is no secret that a town's infrastructure is it's largest asset. As such, there are several associated costs. Bennington and Antrim have shared water and sewer infrastructure. We are each other's backup water source and Bennington owns 25% of the sewer plant in Antrim. The sewer is sent to Antrim via force main along Route 202. In the near future, the federal requirements to update the sewer lagoon will be mandated. Current cost estimates for a new sewer plant are 37 million dollars, Bennington's share to be approximately 9 million. The pump station on Starrett Road is due for rehabilitation and the commission needs to find a backup location for the water supply. Unfortunately, with the volatility in the market it has driven up the cost of annual maintenance and operation costs. Current rates are forcing nonusers (taxpayers) to pay for regular annual operations of the water & sewer system. Moving forward Bennington & Antrim commissioners will work together reviewing what increases are needed.

In 2021 the Select Board supported the water meter upgrade project and it was fully paid for by ARPA Funding. Bennington received approximately \$158,710.00 from ARPA Funding for the meter upgrade. There are still users who have not called to make an appointment to upgrade their meters, this is extending the project length. With this project we were able to lower operation costs on the water side of things. The new meters are radio read like Eversource meters. We no longer need to pay someone to walk the entire system to manually read meters.

As we head toward sustainability of the water and sewer system, the water sewer board and the town auditing firm, have encouraged a separate checking account from the town's financial accounts. We should be ready for that in 2025 quarter one.

If you have not upgraded your water meter, please contact either Zack Andersen or Matt Miller as soon as possible. 603-588-2433. You will continue to see an increased bill until you change your meter out.

TRANSFER STATION:

It has been a busy summer at the Transfer Station on many levels. These warmer months have allowed for folks to get to those projects done at home, resulting in some extra items to roll through the Transfer Station. Also, you may have noticed the recycling building has been getting some needed maintenance done. As time allows, each outer wall is being replaced, as the weather has worn on the building over the years. With some "new" windows and soon to be fresh coat of paint the building will have a new breath of life to last us many more years.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

The Bennington Police Department hopes everyone is having a great Summer! A few updates at the Department; Officer Nicolas Cole has graduated the part-time Police Academy and is now in his Field Training Program. Officer Cole will be road ready by mid-September. Welcome Officer Cole! Sadly, this past June Officer Jeff Danforth moved from a full-time position to a part-time officer position with the Bennington PD to pursue a full-time career outside of police work. We are very appreciative of everything Officer Danforth gave to the Town and wish him the best in his new endeavor. Officer Hayley Minahan was selected to fill the vacant full-time position. Officer Minahan is very excited and has started the full-time Police Academy and is expected to be road ready by December.

Late last year, the Bennington Police Department applied for, and was awarded two Highway Safety Grants for speed equipment and speed patrols, which cover 75% of the costs. This past July, the Bennington Police Department used that grant and received 3 solar powered, digital speed signs which have been mounted on Route 202 and Route 31. These signs were placed to help deter speeding vehicles and also collect data that the Bennington PD can use to modify patrols in those areas.

The officers of the Bennington Police Department want to thank the townspeople for their continued support and we hope you continue to have a wonderful 2024.

SELECTBOARD

The Town of Bennington is an SB-2 Town Meeting form of Government. The Selectboard operates the Town based upon the vote at the March Town Meeting.

The Selectboard meets on Mondays at 6:00 pm, unless otherwise scheduled.

SELECTBOARD MEETING AGENDA: Please call the Town Administrator by Noon the Thursday before a meeting if you want to meet with the Selectboard and be placed on their Agenda.

SELECTBOARD MEETING MINUTES: Minutes are available in "draft" at the Town Office if not yet posted on the website. Website posting is done only after they have been approved at a Selectboard Meeting by the Selectboard.

BENNINGTON 2024 REVALUATION

In accordance with New Hampshire state law, the town of Bennington's contract assessors have begun work on a town-wide Revaluation of all real property with an effective date of April 1, 2024.

The town's last Revaluation was completed with an effective date of April 1, 2019. New Hampshire's State Constitution (Part 2, Article 6) requires values anew, at least, once every 5 years.

Properties in Bennington are selling for historically high amounts. In 2022 the median sales ratio was calculated to be 65.2 % and in 2023 it was 51% and projected to be 47% in 2024. The purpose of the revaluation is to create an equitable distribution of the property taxes, and bring all properties in town to current market value.

The first phase of this process is visiting the properties and measuring to verify the data which was started in 2023. The next phase of the process is reviewing the market/arms-length sales (not foreclosures, distress, family sales etc) that have taken place over the last two years. An assessor from CNP has recently visited these sales that took place between January 1, 2022 and April 1, 2024. The assessing supervisor will now begin the task of updating the building tables to current market cost and analyzing the sales to determine the land values.

Once that process is complete the assessing supervisor will review all values in the town before letters are sent out to each taxpayer. Once the new values have been established and letters have been sent you will have an opportunity to speak with the assessor if you would like to discuss your new assessment.

Once that process is complete, the town with the assistance of the Department of Revenue, will set the tax rate based on the new assessed value and the current budget.

The new assessed values will be effective for the 2nd half 2024 tax bills.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

We have a few newly certified EMT's. The new AED's, that were approved at the 2024 Town Meeting are in the town buildings, and police vehicles.

IT'S THE LAW, FIRE PREMITS ARE REQUIRED!

- Burning of category II and III Fires is allowed between 5:00PM and 9:00AM, unless it is actively raining.
- Landowner permission is required in writing to obtain a legal permit.
- Category I fires must be at least 25 feet from structures or other hazards.
- Category II and III fires must be at least 50 feet from structures or other hazards.
- You must obtain a seasonal permit for your fire pit or cooking fire annually.
- Brush piles require their own permit (you cannot use your seasonal permit), the permitted shall have sufficient water, tools and personnel necessary to control and completely extinguish the fire.
- Permissible materials are clean, untreated wood and brush 5 inches in diameter or less.
- **NO** domestic waste, treated wood or composite materials may be burned.
 - RSA -125N defines "combustible domestic waste" as, but not limited to, household trash, packaging materials, plastics, coated or laminated papers, rubber, painted or treated wood, coated or treated cardboard, oily rags and animal, vegetable, and kitchen waste.
- A complete copy of the laws and regulations can be found online and in person at the fire department.
